Welcome to the First Grade Kindness Learning Activities!

This month, your school community will be emphasizing the importance of kindness. Use this Learning Activity Guide to help students understand and embrace kindness through an engaging video or audio recording, a children's book, a lesson, discussion questions, extension ideas, bonus materials, and at-home engagement. These fun and student-centered activities are cross-curricular and include opportunities for children to collaborate and work independently, exercise their literacy skills and creativity, and develop social and emotional awareness.

The Choose To Be Nice® school program is a comprehensive and engaging SEL (social and emotional learning) program that focuses on the nine important values of respect, kindness, acceptance, teamwork, honesty, responsibility, friendship, patience, and courage. Schools focus on one value per month, and all program components are designed to foster empathy, kindness, and lifelong values that will help children become resilient and compassionate individuals. All learning activities are aligned with the five core social-emotional learning competencies identified by CASEL (Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning), the nation's leading organization advancing the development of academic, social, and emotional competence for all students. As students go through the Choose To Be Nice program and learn and practice the Choose To Be Nice values, they are building their skills in the five competencies: self-management, self-awareness, responsible decision making, relationship skills, and social awareness.

RESPECT - be polite and show consideration for others and their differences

KNDNESS - be nice and friendly to people wherever you go

ACCEPTANCE - appreciate and recognize people for who they are

TEAMWORK - collaborate and work together with others

HONESTY - be truthful and fair

RESPONSIBILITY - be accountable for your own actions

FRENDSHIP - be a friendly companion other people want to be around

PATIENCE - be calm and understand that some things take time and endurance

COURAGE - be brave and dare to be nice even when it's hard

CHOOSE TO BE NICE AT HOME ACTIVITY BOOK

Essential to adopting any new behaviors is making sure the learning reaches home. Choose To Be Nice At Home Activity **Books** help to reinforce the Choose To Be Nice values and encourage positive dialogue at home. Each Guide includes a note to parents/guardians, a fun activity, a chant for younger students, discussion questions, a coloring page and a poster. Be sure to send this guide home prior to starting this month's learning activities.



KIERA THE KINDNESS MOUSE VIDEO

In this short video, **Kiera the Kindness Mouse** introduces younger students to the concept of kindness through everyday examples and builds excitement for additional learning and exploration. The video includes a chant to help kids remember to be kind and offers a foundation for classroom discussions and activities on kindness. Be sure to play this video prior to starting this month's learning activities.

BOOK SUGGESTION: Kindness Is Cooler,

LEARNING ACTIVITY: Kindness Chain

SUBJECT CONNECTIONS: English Language Arts, Visual Arts, Math

MATERIALS NEEDED:

- Copies of Kindness Chain
- Tape
- Safety Scissors

INSTRUCTIONS: Introduce students to Kiera the Kindness Mouse by playing Kiera's video.


Next, hand out copies of the Kindness Chain worksheet to each student. Read **Kindness Is Cooler, Mrs. Ruler**. Ask students to write or draw on a strip of paper each time they hear about a good deed or an act of **kindness** in the story. Remind students to use complete sentences.

When the story is finished, hand out safety scissors to each student and have them cut out their kindness examples. Invite a few students to share the examples that they found with the class. Next, tape the ends together to make a chain link.

Add to the chain by asking students to recognize each other's acts of kindness by writing what they have witnessed that day or week. Begin the chain at the front of the classroom and as it grows, wrap it around the classroom and into the hallway.

The creation of this chain will create excitement among peers and they'll want to add links to the chain as well, which in turn should increase daily kindness in the classroom. The goal is to have 100 chain links, which equals 100 acts of kindness.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS (K-2)

Use these questions to engage students in thoughtful discussions about kindness.

- What can you do to be kind to others?
- How does it feel when people are kind to you?
- How can you show kindness to others online?
- How can we show kindness to a new student?
- How can we show kindness to others when they are not being kind to us?
- Tell me about a time when you showed kindness to another person. It can even be a time when you did not want to show kindness, but you did anyway.
- When people are unkind to you, how does that make you feel? Why?

SOCIAL STORIES (K-2)

Social Stories are fun and engaging short stories that show a Choose To Be Nice value in action. Read the story out loud and use the questions to prompt meaningful discussion.

Story #1: Dante was very nervous to start at a new school this year. He had so many friends at his old school, but he did not know anyone at his new school. He was most nervous about lunch because he was afraid he would not have anyone to sit with. When the bell rang for lunch, Dante walked with his class to the cafeteria. Dante looked around, but did not know where to sit. Quickly, another boy from his class, Jermaine, walked up to him and said, "Hey Dante! You can sit with us if you want! Our table is over here." Dante smiled and nodded. Maybe being at a new school would not be so bad after all.

- Who showed kindness in this story?
- How do you think Dante felt?
- Have you ever been a new student at a school? If so, how did you feel? If not, have you ever shown kindness to a student who was new to your school?

Story #2: During Social Studies class, Mrs. Jones asked each child to talk about a cool place they had visited. After each student shared, Mrs. Jones marked the location on the map. Ryan raised his hand to share. He told everyone about visiting his aunt's ranch in Texas the previous summer. When Ryan started talking, Timothy rolled his eyes and started



mimicking Ryan behind his back. Mrs. Jones could not see what Timothy was doing, but many other students saw him and laughed. When Ryan stopped talking, Anastasia raised her hand to tell Mrs. Jones what Timothy had done. Ryan hung his head as she spoke. Mrs. Jones asked Timothy to stay in during recess to talk about his behavior.

- Who did not show kindness in this story?
- How do you think Ryan felt?
- What could Timothy have done differently to show kindness?
- Has something similar happened to you? How did it make you feel?

EXTENSION IDEAS

Use these Extension Ideas to extend and reinforce the learning anytime throughout the month and year.

- Take a moment each day or week to ask students if they have any acts of kindness they want to recognize and add to the chain link.
- Have students brainstorm a list of different ways they can be kind to others in their CTBN Journal.
- Each week, invite the class to collaborate on an act of kindness for someone within the school or neighborhood community.
- Measure how many chains it would take to reach the front door of the school or wrap around the gymnasium. Set that as a goal to reach for the class or school by the end of the year!

BONUS MATERIALS

Award Certificates: Choose To Be Nice Award Certificates are a great way to promote a positive school culture and reinforce the Choose To Be Nice value of the month. Use the Kindness Award Certificate to recognize those students for consistently being kind and showing kindness toward others.



Reward Tickets: Keep a stack of Kindness Tickets handy. When you observe a student showing kindness through actions, words, or interactions, award them a ticket. Empowering students to award these tickets to their peers is a great way to encourage them to recognize and value kind behavior in different situations. Consider setting up a system where tickets can be exchanged for small rewards or privileges.

Coloring Page: Students can use coloring pages during quiet time. Display completed pages around the classroom to celebrate students' understanding and commitment to kindness.

Poster: Hang the poster in your classroom as a visual reminder of the importance of kindness. Use the poster to spark meaningful discussions about kindness.
